Kia ora koutou,

We had a wonderful Term 2 at Granity Kura, full of engaging learning experiences for our ākonga. Our focus was on learning how to keep ourselves safe, and we were fortunate to have several special visitors to support this kaupapa.

Highlights included visits from the Health Education Trust with Harold the Giraffe, the local Granity Fire Brigade, Education Police Officers, and a session with Westland Milk Products, where students learned how milk is produced—from farm to bottle!

It was certainly a busy term, but the students thoroughly enjoyed every opportunity that came their way. We're also excited to share that our playground has had a little spruce-up and is starting to look much more colourful and inviting for our tamariki. The Pīwakawaka class especially enjoyed creating Matariki inspired artwork and learning about the stories and significance of Matariki. This term, our Inquiry focus is: Who do we share our planet with, and how can we play our part in looking after it? We'll be exploring this through a social science lens. As part of the Arts Curriculum, our students will also be learning some kanikani (dance) this term, which we know they will love!

We're also excited to welcome back Dy Blick, who will be supporting our kura in getting our Garden to Table programme up and running. We're pleased to share that our tunnel house is now up, and we're looking forward to growing our own kai very soon!

A huge thanks to Bev Fastier who is volunteering her time this term to come

and support our tamariki with reading mileage this is hugely appreciated by the team.

You may be aware that we are holding elections this term for new members of our Board of Trustees. 
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NEW BOOK RELEASE



Travel Tales #7 (by Lynne Maguire)

Dear Reader

When exploring new places, I like the spontaneity of 'in the moment,' discovering for myself in my way. I enjoy searching for small plants and animals in quiet places. I've never been much of a fan of hustle and bustle, with lots of noise and having to engage in conversations if I'm not in the mood. There were some moments like that on our holiday in Europe, but more often than not, it was the latter. Busy streets, lots of people, and noise from vehicles followed us wherever we went. Usually, we followed our own itinerary and planned our days for self-discovery; however, on one day in Italy, we took a group tour.

We were in Florence, and my sister had a deep desire to experience Tuscany. It seemed the best way, with our limited time and ability to travel, was a bus tour. We arrived at the meeting place early in the morning and settled into our seats, joining about 40 other tourists, anticipating a long, hot, and tiring day. Our first stop was Siena, where a local guide met us and took us for a walk around the village. The village is divided into several districts, and each district has its own special emblem: a horse, a snail, an eagle, a giraffe, a seashell, and others. To the best of my memory, there are twelve altogether. Walking along the narrow, cobbled streets, with tall buildings on each side, you would see evidence of the district you were in: flags, carvings, building names, and paintings. Siena is famous for its horse race,

which is held every two years. Each district is represented by its horse and rider. The horses are very well cared for and are the focus of the race, not the rider. The day before the race, each horse and rider enters their specific district church for a blessing by a priest. The day of the race draws thousands of people to the village piazza, where there is lots of gambling, drinking, and patriotism. Each horse and rider (the horses are ridden bareback) does two laps of the piazza, and the winner has a year's bragging rights. If a rider falls off but the horse completes the race, it is still the winner. We didn't experience the horse race, but I've watched some YouTube videos since I returned home, and it is something else!

After we visited Siena, we were taken to a local vineyard for lunch. This was a banquet featuring a variety of local produce to enjoy. I was provided with a glutenfree vegetarian meal, and it was one of the best that I had all holiday. We had a variety of red and white wines to sample, followed by a lovely dessert paired with a sweet wine. My sister was very taken with the delicious saffron honey and dessert

wine, some of which eventually made its way back to Australia. Lunch was also an excellent opportunity to meet others on the tour; we represented a global potpourri, mostly, American, as well as English, German, Spanish, Australian, Dutch, and others. I was the only Kiwi, and no one I met that day had even heard of New Zealand.

San Gimignano was our next stop. Again, narrow cobbled streets, steep hills, and tall buildings. We explored the village, did some shopping, and climbed a tower which gave epic views of the countryside. The weather was hot, and we'd been told that the best gelato in Tuscany could be bought in this town. So, we did. And it was! Back on the bus, we travelled to Pisa. I have known about the leaning tower, it seems like all my life, and I was excited to see it. I must admit that I was a bit disappointed, perhaps because I was too tired, too hot, or just over it. We had a look around and took some photos, but I didn't go into the tower. Sitting in the shade, on the grass, watching people was a pleasant pastime. The trip back on the bus to Florence seemed to take a very long time. People were hot and tired, and I heard more than one complaint of sore feet. For me, though, I was feeling pretty content. I don't think I would have gained the stories or met the locals if I had visited by myself, and it was good to sit in a cool air-conditioned bus and be driven from place to place.

This wouldn't be my go-to when I holiday, but would I go on an organised tour again? Yes, I think I would.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor

We share the concerns of our farming and gardening colleagues in northern Buller and around the motu about extreme, impractical, and undemocratic proposals contained in the controversial Gene Technology Bill. This Bill was quietly released for its first reading, just a few days before last Christmas- without consulting the farming sector.

What is proposed is deregulation of outdoor GE crops and animals and the removal of the Precautionary approach, any ethical considerations, and strict liability. No civil liability means there will be no compensation for farmers who are contaminated through all the known vectors: wind, pollen, seeds, vegetative material, soils, waterways, animals, insects, machinery, and extreme weather events including floods.

Regulations exist for a reason. These GMOs are not genetically superior to their non-GM counterparts. Whilst an "on-target" genetic change may be achieved, "off-target", unexpected and undesirable changes- as documented overseas*- can also occur. These can be harmful in terms of food safety, animal welfare and cause major biosecurity breaches and wider environmental damage. Adverse impacts are likely to be irreversible.





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
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COMMUNITY ACTION NORTHERN BULLER



HEALTH TRUST UPDATE

From the Secretary

Following a well-attended public meeting in Ngakawau on July 19th the Trust will be meeting with West Coast Health reps on July 31st to ask further questions around communication and the Ngakawau Clinic. Earlier in the month concerns were raised when it appeared appointments via the online service (Telehealth) previously available were to stop. Health NZ denied this saying Telehealth appointments would continue and that a doctor would be at the clinic regularly over coming months This started on July 17th. The focus of the public meeting was about communications between West Coast Health, Northern Buller Health Trust and the community and how these can be improved. Lack of communication has meant insecurity for our community around its health service's. We've been told that in the year to July we've had 31 face-to-face Dr sessions (the equivalent of a GP here one day a week for six months). There are some doubts about that. We've also been told emphatically that the Ngakawau Clinic will not close. We believe our population numbers and demographic justify that position. It is important that you ask for your medical appointments to be at Ngakawau if using the phone to make them.

Every eight weeks we will be meeting with our health providers to ensure consistency in communications going forward.







KEEP ON TOP OF YOUR MEDS

To avoid running out of your medications check when they are next due and allow at least two weeks prior to that date, so you have enough time to arrange an appointment to see your doctor. All patients should be seen by a doctor every three to six months for repeat medication, unless otherwise documented in your patient notes. Occasionally, prescriptions can be organised over the telephone, these appointments incur a fee and prescriptions will take up to 48 hours to be generated.



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Greetings from your local Constable,

It's certainly been a wet winter, but fortunately, we've avoided any significant flooding or weather-related incidents in recent weeks. As is often the case with policing, there are natural ebbs and flows, and the middle of winter has brought a quieter period. With fewer campervans passing through, a reduction in court files, and locals staying indoors to keep warm and dry, things have settled down somewhat.

Some of you may have seen recent coverage in the *Westport News* regarding the Stockton aerial ropeway protest. Two individuals from the group have entered guilty pleas to trespass charges, while the remaining members are scheduled to go to trial in December. There has been some additional protest activity in the area, and I remain vigilant in monitoring and preventing any further unlawful actions. If you observe anything suspicious, please don't hesitate to report it.

As whitebaiting season approaches, I encourage everyone to check their safety equipment and refresh their understanding of the relevant rules and regulations. Let's work together to ensure the season is safe, respectful, and free from conflict or tragedy.

I've been conducting vehicle stops and checkpoints around the area and am pleased to report minimal issues. On a community note, I had the pleasure of attending the small-bore rifle shooting at the Lyric Theatre on Tuesday night. It's fantastic to see the club active again, and I encourage everyone to get involved and support it. Although I wasn't directly involved, my colleagues recently made a significant arrest in our area. A 29-year-old male, who had been evading police and posing a serious risk through dangerous driving and poor decision-making, was taken into custody. He is currently facing 24 active charges and has been remanded in custody. Please continue to exercise caution on our roads - there are some concerning behaviours out there.

If you need to get in touch, the best way is to call **111** for emergencies or **105** for non-urgent matters. If my sign is out, I'm in the office. If I'm not there, you can use the phone at the station door, which connects directly to 105. You can make a report or leave a message for me to follow up.

Nominations for candidates in the 2025 local elections open on Friday 4 July and close on Friday 1 August. Nomination forms are available at Council service centres.

Roles to elect

Elections are currently held for:

- One Mayor
- Two Councillors to represent Inangahua Ward
- · Two Councillors to represent Seddon Ward
- · Six Councillors to represent Westport Ward
- Four community members to represent Inangahua Community Board (ICB)

Are you eligible to stand?

To be eligible to stand for election, a candidate must be:

- A New Zealand citizen and
- On the electoral roll (18 years or older) and
- Nominated by two people whose names appear on the electoral roll of the area that a candidate is standing for. You don't need to live in the area that you are standing for.

Nominators

Nominators for candidates for Buller District Council or for Inangahua Community Board can be residents or ratepayers who are on the Electoral Roll in that ward.

Enrol by 1 August to vote!

You're probably already enrolled (yay, go you). If you're signed up for national elections, you're automatically good to go for local council ones too. Boom. Democracy unlocked.

But if you've moved, changed your name, or turned 18 recently – check your enrolment is up to date. It takes less time than reheating leftovers.

Need to enrol? Do it by 1 August to get your voting papers in the post.

If you enrol after that, you can still vote, but you'll need to cast a special vote – contact your local electoral officer to find out how to make a special vote

Check your details or enrol now at vote.nz or call 0800 36 76 56.

Key dates for 2025 local elections:

Friday 4 July	Nominations open. Electoral roll opens for inspection.
Friday 1 August	Nominations close at 12 noon. Electoral roll closes.
By 6 August	Public notice of candidate names and special voting places.
9 - 22 September	Delivery of voting documents (will occur between these dates).
9 September - 11 October	Voting and special voting period. Early processing period.
Saturday 11 October	Election Day (voting closes at 12 noon) Progress / preliminary results will be announced as soon as practicable.
11 - 16 October	Official count and processing of special votes.
16 - 19 October	Declaration of final result and public notice of results.

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KEEPING TABS ON YOUR LITTLE BLUE PENGUINS



Māori Name: Kororā

Scientific Name: Eudyptula minor

Conservation Status: **At Risk – Declining**

Other Names Used: little blue penguin, fairy penguin, white-flippered penguin

Fast Facts about Kororā

- Blue penguins are the smallest penguins in the world at just 35-43cm tall
- They weigh between 1 and 1.5kg
- The average life span is 6.5 years, but there are some records of penguins living up to 20 years
- Penguins can travel 15–75 km at sea each day
- Underwater, penguins can reach speeds of up to 6km/hr but average 2–4km/hr
- Their scientific name is Eudyptula, which means good little diver
- Small colonies of up to 40 breeding pairs are found scattered along the West Coast in both rural and urban areas
- Chicks will often return to within a few metres of where they were raised and, once settled in an area, never breed elsewhere
- Blue penguins only come ashore under the cover of darkness
- On the West Coast, penguins come ashore to lay eggs (generally two) and raise young in burrows between June and December
- The chicks are guarded for the first 2-3 weeks, after which both parents go to sea to keep up the supply of fish
- Adults feed their chicks but never their mate. They take over incubation duties so their mate can go to sea to feed
- Chicks usually fledge 8 weeks after hatching and are independent from then on.
- By March they have moulted and returned to the sea.

Last year, the West Coast Penguin Trust contributed to a nationwide study on kororā diet. Scat – aka pooh – was collected in October and sent to Wilderlab for analyses of the DNA. This was then compared with known fish, crustaceans, molluscs etc.

DNA and a list of species was sent back for the exciting bit of working out what the penguins had been eating. Turns out the main prey of our West Coast kororā were blackhead lanternfish or *Lampichthys procerus*, one of 250 species of lanternfish and one that seems to have avoided cameras - just a line drawing exists online. Apparently, they are found around the globe in the southern hemisphere in the region of the Subtropical Convergence. They grow up to 10cm long - perfect size for capture and swallow by kororā. The Trust will be collecting scat seasonally to contribute to this interesting and valuable study.

Put acorn meal and water in a cooking basket (mde with roots).
