TEAM WATSON MAKES PROGRESS ON ALTERNATIVE CHARMING CREEK WALK

Following approval from the Department of Conservation's West Coast Director, a group of Northern Buller residents is forging ahead with plans to redirect walkers over a new section of the Charming Creek Walkway, avoiding dangerous rockfalls which have plagued the track on the southern side of the Ngakawau River since 2019. "TeamWatson" was formed following the CAN-B Momentum event in November 2024 and rapidly grew after a public meeting was held earlier this year to discuss the track's ongoing closure. The group has a current mailing list of 71 and its Watson's Mill Tramway Track will link the township of Hector to the popular walkway via the northern side of the river.

The Watson Brothers (Robert and George) were key figures in the development of a sawmill at Granity Creek and another near the confluence of Charming Creek with the Ngakawau River in the early 1900s. They were responsible for the bush tramway originally developed on the northern side of the river to deliver their product to the local rail head. To avoid the steep Ngakawau Gorge they built a tramway from the mill to Hector. It featured a steep incline that dropped down to the mill and a steam winch located at the brow of the hill. Group spokesperson, Jo Douglas, said reaction from people to their plans to find an alternative access/exit point to the western end of the Charming Creek Walkway was generally positive. "Many are not only interested, but also excited by the project" she said.


"This walkway doesn't just have huge historical significance to our area. It has been greatly utilised by our communities in the past as a place for recreation."

Ms Douglas said the Department of Conservation (DoC), which holds the land under Ecological area status, found that 60% of the old tramway is in good condition. "Diversions around collapsed bridges and tunnels for the walkway will need to be made and the last third of the track still has to be re-discovered through overgrowth" she said.

DOC will mark off areas for preservation. The track will be of "back-country" standard, single

person width, hand tools only - so no heavy machinery.
The eastern end joins the northern Charming Creek Walkway at the remains of the original Watson's Mill. "This means visitors will be able to head down to the tunnel and pop out to views of the Ngakawau Upper Gorge and the Mangatini Falls." At this stage there are no plans to replace the former swing-bridge which was closed by DoC in 2021 for health and safety reasons.

Ms Douglas says there are some financial hurdles to overcome in completion of the track but the group was confident they could find the funding. "DoC gave us an estimate of \$80-100 per meter for a 4Km route which is about \$40,000 to find for using paid contractors." She said the group would be providing volunteer labour for as much as possible. "We'd really like to open the track in the summer of 2026/27". (see page 11 for next meeting date)

Greetings from your local Constable,

As predicted in last month's update, the coal bucket protesters came down the day after it was published. They have since pleaded *not guilty* to charges of Unlawfully Converting a Motor Vehicle, Wilful Trespass, Criminal Nuisance, and Failing to Carry Out their Obligations in Relation to a Computer Search. Their next court appearance is scheduled for 23rd Oct.

The individuals involved, along with the groups they represent, have made it clear that they intend to return and continue opposing mine expansion. I ask everyone to remain vigilant and report anything suspicious you see. I understand this situation can be frustrating, but please do not take matters into your own hands. Vigilante justice is not helpful and only complicates the work of Police.

Over the past month, I've dealt with several civil complaints, including tenancy-related matters. I acknowledge that the line between civil and criminal issues can sometimes be unclear. I'm happy to assist in a mediation-type role where appropriate, but please be aware that other agencies may have jurisdiction in these cases.

Unfortunately, there have been a couple of disputes during the whitebaiting season. Thankfully, these have been relatively minor and mostly stem from people getting worked up and trying to resolve issues themselves. Please continue to be kind and courteous to one another on the riverbanks. If you encounter any problems, report them to me rather than trying to sort them out yourself.

There's been a significant amount of planning recently across Police, Civil Defence, and FENZ in preparation for the inevitable Alpine Fault Earthquake. I've been pleased to be involved in some of this work and encourage you all to undertake your own planning—talk with family members, prepare emergency kits, and have a plan in place.

Lastly, I've noticed an emerging theme around cyclists. I've received complaints from both motorists and cyclists using our roads. Cyclists are plentiful here, particularly with the popularity of the Old Ghost Road. Please remember that cyclists have just as much right to be on the road as cars. If it's safe to pass, give them plenty of room. If it's not, be patient and wait until it is. Cyclists—please make yourselves as visible as possible with lights and hi-vis clothing. The consequences of a collision can be severe.

As always, I'm here to support our community. If you have any concerns or need assistance, don't hesitate to get in touch. Call 111 for emergencies or 105 for non-urgent matters. If my sign is out, I'm in the office. If I'm not there, you can use the phone at the station door, which connects directly to 105. You can make a report or leave a message for me to follow up. Stay safe, and I'll see you around.

Travel Tales #9 (by Lynne Maguire)

Dear Reader

Food is always a bit of an issue for me. I'm gluten-free (health reasons) and vegetarian (personal choice), which makes eating out and traveling a bit of a challenge. I wasn't sure how I'd get on in Europe, especially as my sister is passionate about most foods (is wine a food?). She loves fresh food markets, eating out, and experiencing foods she has never tried before. It stands to reason, then, that eating was a big part of our European experience.

Once we left Spain and our family, we ate out most days. In France and Italy, my sister was adamant that she must have a fresh croissant every day with her coffee. The bakeries and patisseries in both countries were exceptional, and she was not disappointed. Coffee, to my surprise, was average. There were no long blacks in Europe, so I either had an espresso or an americano, which was never to my complete satisfaction. I think one of our best meals was in a small restaurant that we walked past twice before going inside. It was in a small village in Italy, not much to look at from the outside, but the food, service, and atmosphere were perfect. We had a window seat, and we people-watched as we waited for our food. I had ordered a salad with thinly sliced pear and walnuts on lettuce, served with balsamic. It was a light and refreshing end to a day of exploring medieval caves.

If there was a market in the place we stayed, we often got up early and wandered through the aisles looking at all the wares. Everything, from meat and fish to cheeses and wine, to fruits and vegetables, to bread and baking, to chocolate and gelato, was available for purchase. After exploring the market in Nice, we bought some fresh watermelon and sat on the sea wall overlooking the Mediterranean while eating it. As the juice dripped down my chin and the sun sparkled on the water, I was sure holidays didn't get much better than that moment in time.

Of course, in Italy, we had to have pizza. One side street restaurant that we stumbled on while walking around Rome had a spare table. Our waiter said, 'Si, gluten-free pizza,' but when asked if there was a vegetarian option, he rolled his eyes and laughed at me as if I were mad. 'Non, non, you musta have meat!' he exclaimed loudly, so that other patrons turned to stare at us. 'No meat,' I said. He shrugged his shoulders and said Okay. After a short wait, our pizzas arrived, and mine was absolutely delicious, with plenty of vegetables and cheese and a perfect base.

The other must in Italy was gelato. Just around the corner from our accommodation was a gelato shop that claimed to be 'the best gelato in Italy'. Interestingly, this was the second shop in Italy with the same claim, but hey, gelato is gelato, right? No, wrong! Like its cousin ice cream, there are vast

differences, commercial brands versus boutique, organic or not, traditional flavours or modern twists. Within a week, we became 'experts', eating gelato every day, sometimes more than once. I savoured the cool freshness in the heat of the day. It was probably a good thing that we walked many kilometres, and the weather was so warm, otherwise I'd be up-sizing my clothing.

Formally known as the Canterbury Draught Country Classic, it was first won in 1989 by locals Cathreen Gilbert and Ross Harris. Last year's winners were Des & Chrissie Wilcox. Neville and Ian had foresight in bringing this competition into being. It has now become an iconic tournament, enthusiastically supported by local sponsors and is one of the most sought-after pool competition trophies to win in the Buller. 

A highlight this term was visiting other Buller schools where our tamariki proudly performed waiata in our magnificent new uniforms.



- 1 can cream of tomato soup
- 1/2 cup milk
- · 2 cups of potato chips, coarsely crushed






LITTLE BLUE GETS IN BIG TROUBLE



a court trial is looming and rumours are running hot. Ariel seeks refuge back at university in Dunedin where she prefers the company of old gold mining bones to real people.




