#### **LOCAL BODY ELECTIONS**

Local body elections are a vital cornerstone of democracy, giving residents a direct voice in shaping the governance of their communities. With our two current Seddon Ward councillors not having to face an election process this year, the BBB decided to ask them a couple of questions anyway. We wanted to know how they both feel about the next three years at the council table championing for Northern Buller and the district on our behalf.





#### Q: What do you believe are the most pressing issues facing our communities and why?

**Toni** - The three big things for me would be population decline, environmental vulnerability, and limited economic options. We have a small, aging population and rising costs.

**Rosalie** - Cost of living, local infrastructure, employment, and an aging population. All of these things mean our rates need to be affordable with a focus on delivering cost efficient and no-frills solutions that are arrived at in true partnership with our communities.

#### Q: How would you describe your vision for the future of Northern Buller?

**Rosalie-** A place where residents are given full knowledge of the challenges we face, are able to contribute and are listened to and engaged with. A place where we talk with people, not at them, and are given the freedom as councillors to engage meaningfully with staff at every level.

**Toni** - I'm a firm believer in 'Super Local'. If all our Northern Buller communities are networked together, we can become more connected and improve communication. To me, that's key to sustainability—knowing what we need and working together to achieve it.

## Q: What are your priorities for improving local infrastructure, such as roads, water, and waste management?

**Toni** - First, it's about knowing what we need - every community in Northern Buller is slightly different. Local infrastructure needs a strong voice and more choice to make sure we get the most affordable and best-fit solutions for our communities.

**Rosalie** - For me in Karamea, the highway is a big challenge and one I intend to push hard on to ensure ratepayers are not burdened with the costs of this lifeline infrastructure. I will continue to promote the emphasis on "local" in the local water done well space.

#### Q: What will you do to maintain or improve access to healthcare services in our area?

**Rosalie-** I am actively involved in the Northern Buller & Karamea Health Trusts and will continue endorsing the retention and improvement of our health services through these and other forums.

**Toni** - I'll continue promoting enrolments at the Ngakawau clinic to help boost numbers, and I'll work with all stakeholders where I can to encourage good relationships and communication with the WCDHB.

#### Q: How will you support local schools and youth initiatives?

**Toni** - Granity School is looking fantastic with its fresh paint job. I always keep an eye on any risks around our school bus services and I support both local and regional youth initiatives by networking with all stakeholders and sharing information around the community.

**Rosalie** - I will stand in support of our local schools at every level possible and encourage those with youth initiatives to apply for funding to achieve their aims.

## Q: What is your approach to ensuring transparency in council decisions & responsible spending?

**Rosalie-** I will continue to push for more transparency in council decisions and for less public excluded agenda items in future. I have always advocated strongly for responsible spending when it comes to council projects and will continue to do so.

**Toni** - It starts with good relationships between operations and governance, and I will support monthly financial and risk reporting. I always advocate for 'layman's terms' communication so everyone can understand what's going on.

# HARPER LEE TO KILL A MOCKINGBIRD

## NEW BOOK RELEASE

Shoot all the Bluejays you want, if you can hit 'em, but remember it's a sin to kill a Mockingbird. A lawyer's advice to his children as he

defends the real mockingbird of Harper Lee's classic novel - a black man charged with the rape of a white girl. Through the young eyes of Scout and Jem Finch, Harper Lee explores with exuberant humour the irrationality of adult attitudes to race and class in the Deep South of the thirties. The conscience of a town steeped in prejudice, violence and hypocrisy is pricked by the stamina of one man's struggle for justice.

#### Q: How will you prioritise spending on essential services versus new projects?

**Toni** - Carefully. Essential services should always come first, but it's about balance. Wellbeing and culture are also important to our community, and we need to find ways to support both. **Rosalie** - Essential services are the priority. Community-led projects in my experience almost always come from a place of integrity and must be given the careful and respectful consideration they deserve.

## Q: How will you ensure your actions reflect the values and aspirations of our Northern Buller communities?


**Rosalie** - Actions speak louder than words. As a committed community member and councillor for more than 30 years I will continue to my work towards ensuring the values and aspirations of our villages and rural areas are preserved.

**Toni** - I don't pretend to be a mind reader, but I do my best to be involved in all our townships and stay connected. I listen, I stay available, and I share information as openly as I can.

#### Q: What is your decision-making process, especially when faced with conflicting opinions?

**Toni - :** I do my homework. I talk to other councillors, seek advice, and reflect on my local knowledge. When a topic is tough or controversial, I try to organise a public meeting or connect directly with the part of the community affected.

**Rosalie** - I make decisions based on my experience and knowledge of the communities I serve and by listening with empathy and a willingness to compromise. I will always look for common ground to achieve a resolution.

#### THE RIGHT TO VOTE

At the end of the 19th century, women across NZ were involved in the suffrage movement fighting for the right to vote to elect members of the New Zealand House of Representatives.

#### On 19 September 1893,

Governor Lord Glasgow signed a new Electoral Act into law, and NZ became the first selfgoverning country in the world to enshrine in law the right for women to vote in parliamentary elections.

When the Act was passed, suffragists celebrated throughout the country, and congratulations poured in from suffrage campaigners from around the world.



#### Travel Tales #8 (by Lynne Maguire)

Dear Reader

Sitting on a horse with the daughter of my parents' friends, I was on top of the world. I still recall the motion of that animal as we rode down a small pathway, and to this day, 'horse scent' takes me back to that time and place. It is one of my earliest memories that has influenced me for the rest of my life with a love of all things equine. Throughout my life, I have been fortunate to experience the show ring, eventing, hunting, and hacking. I've ridden many different horses and ponies over the years, but these days I enjoy quietly riding on our property.



I've been camel riding in Western Australia through tall eucalyptus trees and parched landscape. I've ridden a quarter horse on a high alpine pine trail in Canada with steep, winding, and narrow pathways. I was hoping to experience at least one horse ride on this trip to Europe. Good ol' Google led me to a few different horse riding businesses, but the one that caught my eye was 'Horseback Riding Ancient Rome.' I contacted my sister, yes, she was keen. After a few emails back and forth, our deposit was paid, and we were booked to go riding in Rome on September 8<sup>th</sup>.

We started our day with a ritualistic visit to a café for coffee before catching a taxi to the stables. We were early, so we went for a walk to explore the area. It was very rural, featuring gated properties that looked very affluent, large houses, and, from what we could see, amazing gardens and landscaping. Eventually, we made our way to the stables and were met by Sandraeo, our guide for the ride.

My horse, named Valentino, was a lovely flea-bitten grey with a nice, free-moving walk, and my sister had Rock, a quiet, well-mannered bay. Now a UNESCO world heritage area, our ride took us along a paved, narrow road that Sandraeo told us was the 'new road;' it was only 500 years old. Soon we came to the 'old road', which was built in 312 BC for military purposes, a war in Southern Italy. The stones on the roadway were flat and smooth. I could only imagine how many thousands, maybe millions of footsteps and horse hooves had travelled this route and worn them down. Maybe hawkers on the roadside selling their wares, slaves and free, beggars and rich, and soldiers off to war. Along each side of the road were marble statues and tombs, buried deep into the ground with wrought-iron gates, of ancient burials. In ancient Rome, citizens were unable to bury the dead within the city walls, so the roadsides became the resting place for the deceased. It was like riding through a history book, all those stories I'd heard of and read about ancient Rome came real as Valentino clip-clopped his way along the Appian Way. Sandraeo gave us commentary in his heavily accented English on the history and modern times of the area. As in the past, the Appian Way is a semi-rural residential area for the wealthy: politicians, international ambassadors, business people, and the aristocracy of Rome. Sitting on our horses, we could peep over stone walls and get a glimpse of life on the other side as we rode past: armed guards, dark windowed shiny black cars, immaculate lawns, barking dogs, ponds, and once a woman in a long flowing dress. It was a world away from The West Coast, yet as I quietly rode along, the privilege of adding my footprint to this amazing historical roadway was both awing and humbling. Thanks to Valentino for enriching my equine experiences.



#### **COMMUNITY ACTION NORTHERN BULLER**

Post CAN-B's community Hui held in June, here are key updates on items being actioned:

- Ngakawau Riverbank Cleanup: Positive feedback received from West Coast Regional Council, MBC, Bathurst, DOC and other key stakeholders who are on-board to help support this community-driven initiative. Aerial satellite images of the riverbank area have been reviewed with key clean-up areas identified. Next step: engage WCRC, MBC and Bathurst to work together on a weed spraying plan to take place over course of several months with multiple weed-sprays needed to rid invasive plant species.
- Team Watson: full steam ahead with creating their new walking path now that DOC's West Coast Director has approved this! See page 22 and follow 'Watson's Track' page on Facebook for updates.
- Northern Buller Workshops: Successful 'Wellness morning' workshop held in Mokihinui on Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> June. Thank you to Buller REAP for funding this initiative and to your community members for organising this! A wonderfully relaxing morning filled with beach yoga, stress management techniques, sound healing and excellent Kai were enjoyed by all who attended.
- Pottery workshops and youth yoga: watch this space for more workshops coming to Northern Buller... your community connector is currently engaging with local potters and yoga Instructors to implement community-driven workshops suggestions.
- Transport initiatives: Buller Taxi's shared the results of their transport survey (available to see on CAN-B's Facebook page). A proposed shared-transport initiative to connect Northern Buller to Westport will be publicly available soon!
- Greenwaste disposal area identified in Mokihinui utilising private land. Location shared on CAN-B's Facebook page.
- Northern Buller 'Community Calendar' concept to be revealed next month.
- Dolphin site: 'Working Bee' suggested to clean up this area. Jade at JK's has kindly agreed to mow the lawns here.







#### Greetings from your local Constable,

At the time of writing, the protest action on the aerial ropeway continues, although I am confident it is nearing an end. I acknowledge the growing frustration within the community about the length of time this situation has persisted. Please be assured that every effort is being made to bring it to a safe and peaceful resolution as swiftly as possible. These situations are complex and require careful handling to ensure the safety of everyone involved. I want to reassure you that those responsible for any unlawful actions will be held accountable through the appropriate legal channels. Police recently discovered two burnt-out vans in the Denniston area. An investigation is underway to determine the circumstances surrounding this incident. At this stage, we are considering whether there may be any connection to the ongoing protest activity. I understand that tensions are high, but I must strongly urge everyone in our community not to take matters into their own hands. Vigilante actions only increase risk and make it harder for Police to do our job effectively. If you have any information, please come forward and speak with me directly.

With white baiting season only days away, I'd like to remind everyone to take a moment to refresh themselves on the current rules and regulations. These are in place to protect the fishery and ensure everyone has a fair and safe experience. Please be kind and patient with others on the riverbanks—conflict helps no one. If you see something concerning or have any issues, report it to me rather than trying to resolve it yourself.

As always, I'm here to support our community. If you have any concerns or need assistance, don't hesitate to get in touch. The best way is to call **111 for emergencies** or **105 for non-urgent matters**. If my sign is out, I'm in the office. If I'm not there, you can use the phone at the station door, which connects directly to **105**. You can make a report or leave a message for me to follow up.

Stay safe, and I'll see you around.

#### **SOLAR POWER FOR COMMUNITY HALLS**

The Ngakawau Community Centre is one of several public buildings in Buller hoping to receive a solar power system funded through an exciting new initiative. Aimed at supporting targeted communities with their emergency planning and energy resilience needs, the Buller District Council is working with the Energy Efficiency & Conservation Authority (EECA) through its Community Renewable Energy Fund (CREF) to deliver a Community Resilience Programme.



EECA plans to assist over 200 sites nationwide to receive a solar PV and battery system for use. The Ngakawau Centre (owned by the Buller Mining Districts Community Centre Society) is one of six Priority 1 eligible facilities used by the community during emergency events.

BDC Group Manager Community Services Krissy Trigg said a working group, which included local Civil Defence representatives, used the EECA's assessment matrix to identify Priority 1 and Priority 2 sites across the district. "Given current funding constraints, the focus is on centralised sites (Priority 1) that provide the most value during emergency responses. Council is hopeful that there will be funding available in subsequent years to allow assessment of the Priority 2 sites at a later date." she said.

The identified Priority 1 sites (in no particular order) are: 1. NBS Theatre, Westport 2. Reefton Community Centre 3. Maruia Community Hall 4. Ngakawau Community Centre 5. Carters Beach Community Hall 6. Charleston Community Hall.

Next steps include site assessments by the system suppliers to identify needs and any issues. Ms Trigg said Council was looking forward to working alongside community groups as the project moves forward. "This programme will provide far-reaching benefits for communities throughout the district, and is of particular importance for our smaller, rural facilities which play a vital role during Civil Defence emergencies." Ms Trigg said regular updates will be provided to keep the community informed as the programme progresses.

#### **TEAM WATSON TRACK NEWS for July-Aug 2025**

The reply to the Letter to the Director West Coast DOC, Owen Kilgour, was received on Tuesday 12 August 2025.

This gives us permission to move forward with progress on the Watson's Mill Tramway Track. Next we will work with Westport DOC and CAN-B to negotiate an Agreement before we can go onto the Tramway.

#### Meanwhile since our last report in July:

Several small missions and one big working bee (of 8 on 26 July) have completed a route to join with the Tramway. Remember this is still Private Land. Only TeamWatson have permission to access and only on working bees.

- Di has been communicating with Backcountry Trust and possible grants

Thank you for your letter of July 2025 regarding the closures of the southern end of Charming Creek Walkway and the Mangatini Falls Swingbridge.

I acknowledge the negative social and economic impact that the closure of the southern section of the Charming Creek Walkway has had on your communities.

Since 2019, the walkway has remained closed due to significant geological hazards, including 19 landslips and the deterioration of the Mangatini Falls Swingbridge. Geotechnical assessments have confirmed that the area poses a substantial risk to public safety and as a result, the southern entrance from Ngakawau must remain closed.

The decision to close the southern part of the track did not come lightly, and the consequences have been deeply felt. Visitor numbers to the southern end were over 13,300 pedestrians and 1,350 cyclists in a single year. The walkway was not only a treasured recreational asset but also a vital contributor to local business income, community wellbeing, and regional tourism.

I support your efforts to investigate the option of reopening the historic Watson's Mill.

Tramway in Hector as a safe and enduring alternative route to the southern end of Charming Creek which would enable the walkway to once more be a through-track. Your efforts reflect the resilience and commitment of Northern Buller residents to preserve access to the natural and historical heritage of the area.

The Department is committed to working alongside community groups to explore viable, safe, and respectful alternatives that honour both conservation values and community needs. Meeting began with introductions for those that had not attended before.

Communications between the Trust and Management: This was the key focus, to maintain and also respect both sides of the table. Explanations were given as to why there was a breakdown, and solutions were sought. Rosale began with wanting an explanation of the face-to-face Doctor sessions, as reported by Helen to be 31. The period of time was not accurate. Helen said it was 31 sessions over a 12 month period. Telehealth sessions were 38 (4 hours at a time) with 15-20 min appointments.

The discussions then went onto comparing populations of Reefton and Northern Buller (including Karamea). Rosalie stated that overall, Reefton had 60 more residents, also closer to Greymouth, had a contingent of nurses, and a Full time St Johns. Then Helen broke the numbers down that we have less registered people within the Northern Buller system. There were a lot of people who casually appear at clinics.

A suggestion was to encourage those that are casual to enrol at their local clinics to boast numbers.

The subject of PRIME call outs was again bought up. Helen said that the nurses are not responsible for these call outs, they should be referred to Ka-Ora Healthline or St Johns. The role of our nurses, she said, was to 'support' a call out, not be the first responder. So for weekends and after hours, those in need have to call the Ka-Ora number if it's a non-emergency, or call St Johns if it is. Mr Wheble also told us there are changes happening with PRIME nationwide but could not elaborate at the time.

In response to being questioned about wait times for St Johns, Mr Wheble stated they have a partnership with them but are not responsible for them. This needed to be bought up with St Johns themselves.

Boasting St Johns memberships and ambulance cover could help the situation. When asked if there was still a shuttle bus between Westport and Greymouth, they said yes there is, but it depends on the condition of the patient that needed to be transported, an ambulance may be required, therefore that's an ambulance less in Westport.

It was suggested we investigate contacting St Johns in Westport and get their side of the story as well. At the end of the meeting, Kate asked Mr Wheble if there were any updates on the old Clinic at Ngakawau.

None that he knew of because the difficulty is that both the old and new clinics are on the same title, difficult to split and obviously not cost affective for the health department.

Meeting closed 11am.
